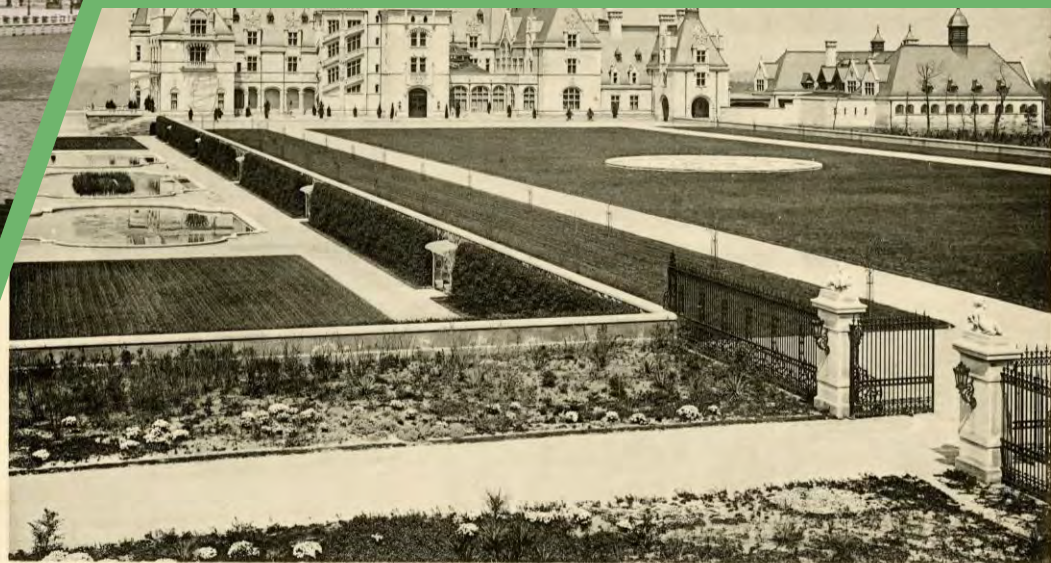


VIEW OF POOL WITH FOUNTAIN AND RHODODENDRONS
